

**TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK  
TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING  
FEBRUARY 8, 2006  
7:30 P.M. AT TOWN HALL**

The meeting of the Colts Neck Township Committee was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Mayor Florek followed by a salute to the flag. The following statement was read by Township Clerk Bowden: "The notice of the requirements of the New Jersey Public Meetings Law has been satisfied by forwarding a "News Release" to the Asbury Park Press on December 22, 2005 stating that the meeting of the Colts Neck Township Committee would be held on February 8, 2006 at 7:30 p.m., Colts Neck Town Hall, 124 Cedar Drive, Colts Neck. The notice requirements have been posted on the Township Bulletin Board and a copy is on file in the office of the Township Clerk."

Roll call by Mr. Bowden indicated the following:

1. **REMEMBRANCE OF MR. HAROLD G. "JAKE" GUNTHER, SR.:** Mayor Florek opened the meeting with the announcement of Mr. Gunther's recent death and then requested a moment of silence in his memory. Mayor Florek spoke briefly of Mr. Gunther's wide-reaching impact on the Colts Neck Community, and especially the Volunteer Fire Department. Information on the funeral arrangements was provided, and Mayor Florek advised the Township Committee would formally recognize Mr. Gunther at its next meeting on February 22<sup>nd</sup>.
2. **BUDGET ANNOUNCEMENT:** Mayor Florek advised the first budget review session was scheduled for Saturday, February 11<sup>th</sup>, 9:00 a.m. at Town Hall. All are welcomed to attend.
3. **COLTS NECK POLO PRESENTATION:** Mayor Florek turned the floor over to Mrs. Burry, Liaison to Colts Neck Polo. Messrs. Arthur Goodwin and James Schatzle were welcomed. Mrs. Burry stated the "sport of kings" is definitely alive and well in Colts Neck. Mr. Goodwin thanked Mrs. Burry, proudly stating the Colts Neck Polo organization is entering its 12<sup>th</sup> year of bringing the game of polo to Colts Neck. Mr. Schatzle thanked the Township Committee's present and past members for supporting the Polo organization. The Polo organization's fund-raising efforts support numerous youth programs within Colts Neck as well as the American Heart Association, SPUR (Special People United to Ride), Monmouth County Conservation Foundation, Meridian Health Care, Lincroft Village Greens Association and 180 Turning Life Around: Amanda's Easel. Tonight the Colts Neck Polo organization presented a donation to David Gallela, representing the St. Mary's Youth Group, and Rev. Chris Vande Bunte, representing the Colts Neck Reformed Church. Mr. Schatzle stated the young men and women of both groups provided essential services by setting up, running, and breaking down the polo matches held in 2005. To date, the Colts Neck Polo organization has donated more than \$32,000 to the Colts Neck First Aid and Fire Cadet Programs and the church youth groups. The work of the Colts Neck Polo organization and the church youth groups was applauded by all present.
4. **MUHLENBRINK ROAD SPEED LIMIT PETITION** – Mr. Vesel Ramovic addressed the Township Committee regarding the petition requesting a change of posted speed limit from 35 m.p.h. to 25 m.p.h. Mr. Ramovic stated the road is utilized by joggers, walkers and cyclists, who are all at risk with increased vehicle traffic often exceeding the posted speed limit. Mr. Ramovic stated placing the

police speed limit car is not a deterrent since everyone knows an officer is not stationed in the car.. Mrs. Burry and Mr. Stuart suggested having the residents purchase the plastic figures holding flags stating “slow - kids at play” as an unofficial reminder to passing motorists to slow down. Both Committeepersons said that approach worked on New Street and Swimming River Road. Mr. Bowden advised the cost to change the speed limit is approximately \$2500 and would require an engineer study. Mayor Florek stated the Township would provide increased police presence and speed limit enforcement initially, and he directed Mr. Bowden speak with the Police Chief. Mayor Florek asked Mr. Ramovic to keep the Committee apprised of the success of these efforts within the next three to five months.

5. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF JANUARY 25, 2006:** Mrs. Burry asked to have the approval of the minutes held until the next meeting.
  
6. **RESOLUTION 2006-28:** AUTHORIZING SUBMISSION OF PLANNING INCENTIVE GRANT APPLICATION BY THE TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK FOR BLOCK 9, LOT 7 (FORMER SMITH FARM) was read by title by Mayor Florek. Mr. Bowden advised the Township Committee of Mr. Anfuso’s concerns for their consideration prior to adoption of this resolution and subsequent application submission. The acceptability of the size and location of the 1.5 acre exception noted on the map provided was raised. Mr. Bennett advised that the Township can apply to the County to relocate the exception; however, space should be adequate for farm equipment. Secondly, Mr. Anfuso asks if the Township wanted to perform soil testing to ensure it will support a septic system. After much discussion, Mr. Bowden advised he will work with Bill McBride and Glenn Gerken and will report back to the Committee. He will draft a more detailed resolution that will appear on the agenda in approximately two meetings.
  
7. **RESOLUTION 2006-29:** A RESOLUTION OPPOSING SENATE BILL NO. 457, AMENDING THE TIME OF DECISION RULE was read by title by Mayor Florek. Mr. Bowden explained application and zoning changes require public discussion and hearings; however the passage of this bill would permit developers to “beat the clock” by filing applications and freezing the ability of local officials to act. After comment by the Committee, Mrs. Burry made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Stuart, carried by Mr. Hennessey and Mayor Florek and opposed by Mr. Forester.

10. **DISCUSSION:** ROAD OPENING PERMIT AND EASEMENT REQUEST – 100 CONOVER ROAD (MR. DONALD FEWER). The applicant is working with the Gas Company and the Township Committee to bring natural gas service to his property. The shortest route would cross Fox Hedge, cut under the greenway and Conover Road to the property. This route may entail a 2” trench across the greenway and Conover Road, but would be accomplished at no cost to the applicant. An alternate connection would travel North on Route 34, and would entail upgrading the 2” line on Conover Road to a 6” line and upgrade the line along Conover Road at a total cost of \$53,000 (\$30,000 out of pocket). Mr. Stuart advised the Shade Tree Committee studied the proposal and has no objection to crossing through the greenway, but the tree roots should be carefully avoided. Mr. Hennessy asked if the homeowner considered oil as an option. He was advised the homeowner desired natural gas. Mrs. Burry asked what service the other two homes east of this residence have, but this could not be determined this evening. Mr. Bowden advised this would require an easement, the cost of which would be borne by Mr. Fewer. Since this involves a County road, the County would have to approve the plan. Mayor Florek stated that there would be less disturbance going through the greenway and across Conover Road than changing the gas line along the length of Conover Road and asked for a motion to approve relief. Mr. Stuart made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Forester and unanimously approved. Mr. Bowden will advise legal counsel and the meets and bounds are to be provided to Mr. Bowden.

11. **RESOLUTION 2006-31A:** RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE PROPOSED REGIONAL STORMWATER MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR THE ENTIRE NAVESINK RIVER DRAINAGE BASIN was read by title by Mayor Florek. The Regional Stormwater Management Plan has been proposed for the entire Navesink River watershed, which includes all of Colts Neck Township. This Regional Plan supersedes the municipal Stormwater Management Plan and is of such a magnitude as to make local implementation and management infeasible. The Township Committee believes stormwater planning should take place on a much smaller scale than what is proposed and concurs with Mr. Anfuso's position that implementation of this large-scale plan could create chaos. Mr. Forester made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Hennessy and unanimously carried.

12. **ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT:** Mr. Bowden had no additional comment to his report, and reported the following:

Mr. Bowden advised the Police Chief is requesting permission to order two marked police cars to replace two patrol cars with 120,000 miles each. On average, each patrol car travels 25,000 miles per year, with the 6-car fleet traveling approximately 150,000 patrol miles per year in total. Plans for one of the retired vehicles would be to provide it to the Fire Chief for his use. This is not an expansion of the patrol fleet, but a replacement of existing vehicles with substantial mileage. Mr. Stuart made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Hennessy, and unanimously carried by voice vote.

Mr. Bowden reported no parking has occurred on Pheasant Drive during school hours since the passage of Ordinance 2006-3, which prohibits parking while school is in session. Willow Lake Drive residents have expressed concern over student parking on their street and are taking a pro-active stance by assembling a petition requesting a parking ban similar to that of Pheasant Drive. Mr. Bowden has personally observed the surrounding streets and sees no cars parked on Montrose Road or Victoria Way. Mr. Stuart agreed to meet with Mr. McChesney, Principal of Colts Neck High School, to discuss the parking issue and Mayor Florek concurred with this action. Mr. Bowden mailed a copy of the parking ordinance to Mr. McChesney and placed a call to speak with him; however, as yet, the call has not been returned. Mr. Bowden will arrange the meeting.

Mr. Bowden provided the Township Committee with the cost estimate of \$2,000 for General Code Publishers to update the Township court-imposed fines to \$2,000 in current ordinances. In addition, General Code estimates review and drafting services at \$835. Mr. Hennessy stated he will speak with Judge Thompson about increasing the fees during the upcoming budget session. Mr. Bennett stated the maximum fine would be for repeat offenses. Mrs. Burry

suggested the Township Attorney provide review and drafting services, which should be at a lesser cost than the \$835 quoted by General Code.

Mr. Bowden discussed the January 2006 invitation by the State's DEP Green Acres Program to apply for Green Acres Funds, the deadline of which has been extended until April 14, 2006. Funding is extremely limited and competition will be fierce. Green Acres will only consider funding requests from new applicants or from applicants who have completed or are making significant progress on previously approved projects. Local governments are encouraged to consider supplemental acquisition funding available through the New Jersey Environmental Infrastructure.

Mr. Bowden reported Jersey Central Power and Light will be performing maintenance on its overhead transmission power lines via helicopter aerial patrol in the Central New Jersey area from February 13 through February 16.

Mr. Bowden then referred to a memorandum from the Monmouth County Park System, which officially extends the period for public comment on the Preliminary Draft Monmouth County Open Space Plan to February 28, 2006. After the public comment period, the preliminary Draft will be revised by the Park System and submitted to the Monmouth County Planning Board, who will be asked to adopt the Plan as an element of the County Master Plan. Mrs. Burry stated there are 120 acres contiguous to Hominy Hill Golf Course that would be an excellent addition to the Open Space Program. Both the County Planning Board and the Freeholders must approve this plan, which would have positive impact on Colts Neck..

13. **MOTION TO APPROVE VOUCHERS.** Mr. Forester reviewed and signed the vouchers for this meeting, stating the Township does not spend much. Mr. Forester made a motion to approve all vouchers totaling \$4,567,834.24, seconded by Mrs. Burry and unanimously carried.

14. **TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

Mrs. Burry reported tomorrow evening the Board of Freeholders Agenda includes the approval of funding for the Recreation proposal to replace the Fitness Trail at Town Hall Park. Under the proposal, the County would pay 50% and the Township would pay 50%. The next application cycle deadline is October, with final decisions anticipated by December.

Mrs. Burry cited the great loss experienced Monday when the recently renovated Visitor Center at Thompson Park burned. While the building and its art work were well insured, it is a tremendous loss. The results of the Fire Marshall's report is eagerly anticipated.

Mrs. Burry announced the Spring reception of the Historical Preservation Committee will be held at Linda Bremer's home on Merchant's Way On Sunday, March 19. All Township Committee members are invited.

Mrs. Burry noted a check was received last week for the Montrose Road School house in the amount of \$1,050.

Mrs. Burry proposed the Historic Preservation Committee purchase of a Muriel Rogers painting of Flock Farm, depicted at the turn of the century. The painting is priced at \$1600 and would be purchased from Trust Fund monies, which are not part of the municipal taxes. Mr. Stuart made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Hennessy and unanimously carried by voice vote.

Mrs. Burry would like to formally present the painting at the next Township Committee Meeting on February 22, 2006.

Mrs. Burry stated the National Parks Calendar at Gettysburg included a full set of original sketches from Duncan Thecker. These sketches are quite valuable, and their inclusion in this calendar illustrates the impact Colts Neck residents have in our Nation's rich history.

Mr. Forester stated the Board of Health did not meet since the last Township Committee Meeting.

Due to a conflict in schedule, Mr. Forester was unable to attend the February 1<sup>st</sup> Senior Citizens Meeting.

Mr. Stuart met with Dr. Fitzpatrick and Chief Sauter yesterday to discuss the Board of Education's telephone emergency alert system. This is a Honeywell System that requires no hardware purchase. One person is designated to operate this system, and the system can be accessed from any computer. Once the address and telephone number is given, emergency call centers based in Atlanta and on the West Coast process the emergency alert notifications. The sales manager advised Mr. Stuart there is no "piggy backing" onto the existing Board of Education system; the Township would be a separate account. Cost to the Board of Education is approximately \$3 per child; the industry standard is \$11 per enrollee. Mr. Stuart will continue to research this issue and will study the "Reverse 911" system hardware currently available and report back to the Township Committee.

Mr. Stuart advised Senate Bill 206 regarding non-agricultural uses of farms was discussed at the Agriculture Board and was passed. This bill is designed to aid farms not having an exception or coming into the Program after January. The primary emphasis is cell towers and antennas and "bed and breakfasts", which can only expand their current space by 500 sq. ft. The permit for a license would be 20-years. This is subject to local review and approval.

Mr. Stuart reported the Shade Tree Committee is working on several cases on Rivers Edge. There are legal hurdles and the Shade Tree Committee will be discussing them with the Township Attorney.

Mr. Hennessy stated the dedication of Five Point Park will be Sunday, April 2, 2006.

On Saturday, April 1, 2006, the Colts Neck High School track will be dedicated. Marching bands from the armed services are scheduled to perform, and overall attendance is projected at 4,000-5,000.

Mr. Hennessy stated Bob McNamara, a professional in transportation, wrote a letter to the author indicating the DOT misspelled the street sign for Five Point Road at the traffic intersection of Route 537 and Five Point Road (at Colts Neck

High School.) Mrs. Burry commented the current misspelled sign (Five Points Road) will be replaced.

Mayor Florek noted the recycling tax on solid waste generation results in approximately \$15,000 per year for Colts Neck. This may double, reaching approximately \$34,000 per year. Mayor Florek's concerns are two-fold, i.e., that the cartage companies would pass on the increase to consumers; and what portion of the tax to homeowners would be returned to them? Mayor Florek stated he is a strong proponent of recycling, but he is undecided about endorsing this tax.

Mayor Florek reported that Jake Gunther received a standing ovation for his many years of service to the community at the recent Fire Department Installation Dinner held January 25. Mayor Florek stated this was a truly memorable part of the evening for all attendees.

Mayor Florek reported on April 22, 2006, the Colts Neck Sports Foundation will celebrate Opening Day at the Laird Road fields. In anticipation of a new season, Sports Foundation is paving the basketball courts, installing the well for field irrigation at Laird Road, and landscaping and improving the playing fields. In addition, the Sports Foundation unanimously approved \$17,000 in matching funds for the Conover Road and Cedar Drive tennis courts.

15. **COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC:**

Mayor Florek opened the meeting to public comment.

Ms. Virginia Amend, publisher of the Colts Neck Calendar and a resident, asked if the Judge can obviate the fine for persons caught speeding and require the offenders watch a film on the ramifications of speeding. Mr. Bennett advised the Judge cannot do this. Mr. Bennett stated the two-point speeding ticket costs approximately \$150 plus court costs and a no-point ticket costs \$450 plus court costs. For offenders caught traveling at 100 m.p.h. or greater, the Colts Neck Judge orders loss of license for 30 days.

Mr. Vince Domidion, a resident, commented that the Smith Farm property at the intersection of Route 34 and Conover Road sits on sand and should perc very well. He expects good results from the planned soil testing.

Ms. Charlotte Sterner, a resident, asked if the Township Committee has heard from anyone else regarding the proposed Colts Neck Craft Fair in Bucks Mill Park. She stated the Craft Fair dates conflict with the Colts Neck Polo schedule. Mayor Florek responded that while the ordinance has passed the terms of the agreement for the Craft Fair are still being negotiated.

Ms. Judy Laufer, President of Colts Neck Senior Citizens and a resident, reported 104 Seniors participated in the Meet Harry Truman entertainment. The Seniors traveled to the Count Basie Theatre for musical entertainment and then dined at La Bella Vida in Long Branch.

Ms. Gloria Lupia, a resident, asked about the status of the unmarked paved shoulder at the St. Mary's intersection of Phalanx Road in a westward direction with Route 34. The unmarked pavement is resulting in a variety of very dangerous driving maneuvers, which may cause accidents. Instances of motorists in the actual lane (nearest the center pavement dividing line) making right turns are having near misses with motorists using the paved shoulder as a through lane across Route 34. Mayor Florek advised this is a State issue and the possibility of pavement markings is being pursued.

Ms. Amend commented that the trash seen around Town has fallen from uncovered garbage trucks passing through on the way to the dump site. Mayor Florek asked that a form letter be sent to the cartage companies advising of the

trash problems and requesting all trash in the trucks be properly secured. Tickets will be issued to offenders.

Ms. Laufer reported that she recently found a skunk in her back yard one Sunday. She contacted the Police, who, in turn, contacted Animal Control. She was extremely pleased Animal Control responded to this call for help on a Sunday and successfully removed the skunk.

With no further comments, Mayor Florek closed the public portion of the meeting.

16. **RESOLUTION 2006-32:** EXECUTIVE SESSION was read by Mayor Florek at p.m. Mrs. Burry made a motion to approve seconded by Mr. Stuart and unanimously carried.
