

**TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK  
COMMITTEE MEETING  
OCTOBER 27, 2005  
7:30 P.M. AT TOWN HALL**

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The meeting of the Colts Neck Township Committee was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Mayor Forester followed by a salute to the flag. The following statement was read by Township Clerk Bowden. "The notice of the requirements of the New Jersey Public Meetings Law has been satisfied by forwarding a "News Release" to the Asbury Park Press on October 15, 2005 stating that a meeting of the Colts Neck Township Committee would be held on October 27, 2005 at 7:30 p.m., Colts Neck Town Hall, 124 Cedar Drive, Colts Neck. The notice requirements have been posted on the Township Bulletin Board and a copy is on file in the office of the Township Clerk".

Roll call by Mr. Bowden indicated the following:

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1. **ANNOUNCEMENT:** PRESERVATION OF GREENFIELDS FARM – BLOCK 5, LOT 2 – WILLOW BROOK ROAD. Mayor Forester turned the meeting over to Mrs. Burry and Mr. Stuart. Mrs. Burry stated that an agreement was reached with Mrs. Purdy for the Township's acquisition of 111 acres with a four acre exception under the open space farmland preservation program. The cost of the acquisition is split three ways between the State (57.26%), the Township (25.43%) and the County (17.31%). Mrs. Burry praised Mrs. Purdy, the land owner, for working with the Township to make this acquisition a reality. Mr. Stuart indicated this is one of the two largest farms in the open space farmland preservation program to-date. On behalf of the Farmland Preservation Committee, Mr. Stuart thanked Ms. Kim Rothberg and Mr. Tom Orgo for their active participation in this significant Township acquisition. Mr. Stuart indicated all were hoping to close by the end of 2005.
  
2. **PRESENTATION:** PERMANENT FINANCING OF TOWNSHIP DEBT. Mr. John Antonides, Finance Officer, discussed the various bond obligations issued since 2001 for the acquisition of property, park construction, various road improvements, and rehabilitation of affordable housing. By incorporating these debts, including the soon-to-close Purdy property, under the Monmouth County Improvement Authority (MCIA) Pooled Governmental Loan Revenue Bonds, Series 2005, the Township could benefit from the Aaa/AAA County Bond Rating, and the debt would be amortized over 17 years. Mr. Antonides stated the interest rate averaged 3.2% in 2002, and is estimated to be 3.8%-3.9% over the 17-year lifetime. If the Township Committee agrees to go forward with this, a resolution approving the application to the Local Finance Board pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:2-26 would have to be adopted, and Mr. Antonides would then have to go to Trenton.
  
3. **RESOLUTION 2005-257:** RESOLUTION APPROVING APPLICATION TO THE LOCAL FINANCE BOARD PURSUANT TO N.J.S.A. 40A:2-26. Based on the presentation made by Mr. Antonides, Mrs. Burry made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Florek and unanimously carried.

4. **PUBLIC HEARING:** MONMOUTH COUNTY OPEN SPACE GRANT to replace the Life Fitness Trail at Town Hall Park. Funds for this project will be provided through a County grant (\$16,000) and Township funds (\$16,000), with an estimated total cost of this project to be \$32,000. Mrs. Burry stated this is a good application with wide interest and many users. Mayor Forester opened the meeting to public comment. Mr. Vince Domidion, a resident, commented that this is a community resource, used by residents of neighboring towns, not just a Colts Neck resource. Mr. Chuck Cammarata, a resident, asked the total cost of the project and was advised it was \$32,000. Mr. Ed Piotrowski, a resident, commented that replacing the stations and dressing up the fitness trail would be a positive improvement. With no further public comment, Mayor Forester closed the public hearing.
  
5. **RESOLUTION 2005-256:** AUTHORIZING SUBMISSION OF MONMOUTH COUNTY OPEN SPACE GRANT – LIFE FITNESS TRAIL was read by Mayor Forester by title. Mrs. Burry made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Hennessy and unanimously carried.

7. **ORDINANCE 2005-24:** BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ACQUISITION OF DEVELOPMENT RIGHTS FOR THE PURDY FARM, BLOCK 5, LOTS 2 AND 2Q, AND APPROPRIATING \$1,800,000 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,720,000 BONDS AND NOTES TO FINANCE A PORTION OF THE COSTS THEREOF, AUTHORIZED IN AND BY THE TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, NEW JERSEY was read by title by Mayor Forester. Mrs. Burry stated that approximately 25.4% of the total cost would be assumed by the Township with both State and County financial participation. This farm has been in the Purdy family for generations and the Township’s acquisition of the development easements will ensure it remains part of the Township’s farmland and open space landscape. With no further comments, Mr. Stuart made a motion to approve, seconded by Mrs. Burry, and unanimously carried. Mayor Forester set the date for public hearing on November 9, 2005.

9. **ORDINANCE 2005-25:** AUTHORIZING THE TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK TO ACQUIRE, AND SUBSEQUENTLY ASSIGN TO THE STATE AGRICULTURE DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE, THE DEVELOPMENT RIGHTS FOR CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY KNOWN AS THE “PURDY FARM”, ALSO KNOWN AND DESIGNATED AS BLOCK 5, LOTS 2 AND 2Q ON THE COLTS NECK TOWNSHIP TAX MAP was read by Mayor Forester by title. Mr. Bennett then clarified that Ordinance 2005-24 provided the funding to acquire the Purdy Farm, while this ordinance authorizes the acquisition and subsequent assignment of this property to the State Agriculture Development Committee (SADC). Mr. Stuart made a motion to approve, seconded by Mrs. Burry and unanimously carried. Mayor Forester set the date for public hearing on November 9, 2005.

10. **ORDINANCE 2005-26:** AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 51, ENTITLED “POLICE DEPARTMENT” OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK was read by Mayor Forester by title. Mayor Forester stated this resolution pertained to outside employment of Township police officers paid through the Township and reimbursed by the contractor. Mayor Forester indicated the \$8 per hour paid to the Township covers the vehicle expense, FICA, and Workmen’s Compensation. Mr. Florek suggested a revision to § 51-9.B.(1)(b) to tie the \$30 - \$50 rate of officer’s pay

to a proportionate amount paid the Township (\$2.50 to \$8.00 per hour). Mr. Stuart agreed that the rate of officer pay and the rate paid to the Township should be proportionately related to each other. With no further comments, Mr. Stuart made a motion to approve, with additions, seconded by Mr. Florek and unanimously carried. Mayor Forester set the date for public hearing on November 9, 2005.

11. **RESOLUTION 2005-258:** RESOLUTION APPROVING PROPERTIES FOR INCLUSION IN THE TOWNSHIP'S PLANNING INCENTIVE GRANT LIST OF ELIGIBLE SITES was read by title by Mayor Forester. 12. **RESOLUTION 2005-259:** CONFIRMING USE OF COUNTY PURCHASING COOPERATIVE BID FOR ROCK SALT (SODIUM CHLORIDE) FOR 2006 – MONMOUTH COUNT BID NO F-43-2006 was read by title by Mayor Forester. Mr. Bowden then stated the Township is now paying \$38 per ton, and the 2006 cost under this cooperative bid would be \$43.29 per ton, a \$5 per ton increase. In a bad winter, the Township uses between 2,000 and 3,000 tons of rock salt. The product would be delivered to the Township storage site. With no further comments, Mrs. Burry made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Florek and unanimously carried.

13. **DISCUSSION:** REQUEST TO EXCHANGE BLOCK 46, LOT 1/1, BRETWOOD DRIVE SOUTH, LOCK ARBOR LANE AND HOMINY HILL ROAD WITH LELAND ROAD, LOT 17.12. On October 6, 2005, Diane Aifer, Esq. sent a letter to John O. Bennett, III., Esq., Township Attorney, with copies to Michael Steib, Esq., Planning Board Attorney; Mr. Timothy Anfuso, Township Planner; Mr. Robert Bowden, Township Clerk; and the Township Committee requesting the aforementioned exchange of property. Mr. Bennett stated the requested relief would have to come from the Planning Board, not the Township Committee. Ms. Aifer stated whenever similar issues occurred, the governing body would be sought to issue their opinion prior to returning to the Planning Board for a decision. Based on an informal poll, Ms. Aifer indicated the neighbors were in favor of having a house constructed on the corner property that is now being used as a construction staging lot. If not granted, the lot would remain as open space. Mayor Forester commented that if the lots were exchanged, they are not of equal size (4 acres versus 3 acres). Because of its proximity to Route 18, Lot 17.12 would make a better screen if it were left in its current natural state without a home on it. Mrs. Burry commented that she sees the advantage of building on Lot 1/1; however the applicant has to provide more parity to the Township to equal the values of the land exchanged. Mr. Stuart stated he is not opposed to working this out. Mr. Bennett stated that since both lots are owned by the same person, the property exchange sought is not enhancing one owner at the expense of another. Mayor Forester then opened the meeting to public comment. Mr. Thomas Orgo, a resident, stated Lot 1/1 is a smaller lot to build on and would have more building restrictions than other properties. Mr. Vince Domidion, a resident, indicated Lot 17.12 would be a very nice property to preserve in its current natural state whereas Lot 1/1 is already disturbed. With no further comments, Mayor Forester closed the meeting to comments from the public. Mr. Bennett stated that if the Planning Board agrees with the transfer, but requires a Township Committee resolution, the issue should be returned to the Township Committee; however, at this point, no decision would be rendered by the Township Committee. When asked if the governing body would insist on the deed restriction remaining, Mr. Hennessy indicated the Township Committee would reserve judgment unless it returns to the Township Committee after being addressed by the Planning Board.

14. **DISCUSSION:** USE OF PUBLIC PARKS FOR ENTITIES ENGAGED IN “FOR PROFIT” VENTURES was brought forward by Mr. Hennessy. Mr. Hennessy read excerpts from the purpose, goals, premise, and basic types of park use by non-agency group, from a handout provided to the Township Committee. With the Recreation and Parks “pay as you go” budget, this would give the Township the ability to choose the events coming into Town.

It is estimated that four events per year would raise monies that could be used to supplement the \$38,000 per year Parks Maintenance budget and fund initiatives such as field irrigation, etc. Mr. Bowden stated Mr. Bennett brought two sample ordinances for Township Committee consideration. Mr. Hennessy stated the Township Committee can pick and choose from those profit-making ventures seeking use of the Township parks. Mrs. Burry stated it is essential the Township has that choice. Mr. Bowden indicated the language is consistent with the Recreation mission. Green Acres regulations are neutral on whether events held within Township parks need to be a recreation event. Mr. Florek stated the parks are here for the public benefit. He stated it is not good to rent out the parks to for profit entities because of the wear and tear on the parks and the additional maintenance that would be required. Colts Neck has been very selective on raising revenue. Mr. Florek stated he personally does not want to rent out the parks. Mr. Stuart asked the number of craft fairs or events that would be considered. Mr. Hennessy responded four. Mrs. Burry asked if Five Point Park would be included. Mr. Hennessy stated any park the Township Committee deems appropriate to use would be included. Mrs. Burry stated a sound ordinance needed to be written with limitations made on the time of year events could be held. Mr. Hennessy agreed. Mayor Forester stated he hates to overturn past ordinances and is inclined to vote “no”. Mr. Hennessy wants to see a draft ordinance presented to the Township Committee for their consideration and at least give it a chance. Mr. Florek does not agree. Mr. Stuart stated he would like to look at a draft ordinance, and he has no problem with the concept. Mrs. Burry wants to see an ordinance drafted for consideration. Mr. Bennett was directed to prepare a working draft ordinance for the December meeting with possible introduction at the January Township Committee meeting.

- 15. **ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT:** Mr. Bowden provided the Township Committee with handouts covering the “Pay to Play” issue. The State law becomes effective January 1, 2006 and pre-empts local ordinances. Under this new law, all Township contractors and vendors receiving \$17,500 or more must certify that they haven’t paid over \$300 in political contributions. This topic will be covered at the upcoming League of Municipalities Convention.
- 16. **MOTION TO APPROVE VOUCHERS** was made by Mrs. Burry to approve all vouchers totaling \$3,951,407.29, seconded by Mr. Florek and unanimously carried.

17. **TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

Mr. Hennessy had nothing further to report.

Mr. Florek reported the Fire Companies are in the process of preparing their budgets for 2006.

Mrs. Burry and Mr. Stuart met with Mr. Gale at Earle Naval Station, and there is nothing new to report. Fort Monmouth is on the “short list” of facility closures mandated by the Federal government.

Mr. Stuart has been in touch with the Code Enforcement Officer. There has been much activity within the Township requiring his services.

Mrs. Burry asked about the status of Five Point Park. Mr. Hennessy reported the fields were re-seeded this fall and it should be ready for opening Spring 2006. The general public is permitted to walk through the park; however, no organized activities are permitted on the fields and the play area is off limits.

Mayor Forester stated he visited with the Senior Citizens and received his flu shot. The flu shots were then administered in the Municipal Court the following week. There was a large participation in this year's flu shot program. Mayor Forester has asked a letter be prepared to Dr. Faistl thanking him for his participation in this Township program.

18. **COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC:**

Mr. Vince Domidion, a resident, commented that he was ambivalent about the proposed commercial activity in the Township parks. He feels as long as the uses tie into the recognized recreational uses, e.g., Little League, Polo, etc., the Township benefits and the organization benefits.

Mr. Domidion suggested adding language to the Police officers ordinance being drafted indicating the amount paid to the Township for administering this program should cover the costs of to the Township associated with the details.

Mr. Chuck Cammarata, a resident, asked how the traffic problem with the Cottage Crafts Fair had been resolved at Bucks Mill Park. Mr. Hennessy responded the original mailing showed only one way to access the Park. Now, directions show five routes to access the Park. The signage has improved. Cottage Crafts hire more professional police to direct traffic to improve the traffic flow. In addition, a more professional group is employed to aid in parking cars.

Mr. Ed Piotrowski, a resident, asked if the Township parks could be rented by "for profit" ventures, who would be in control? Mr. Hennessy responded that the draft ordinances have to be reviewed; however, he feels the Township Committee would make the final determination

Mr. Chris Lupia, a resident, commented that for many years, people walked their dogs in Town Hall Park. Now signs are posted that prohibit dog walking. Many towns invite animals, including the dog run in nearby Holmdel Park. Since there is talk of refurbishing the trails, can Town Hall Park be equipped with dog waste bags and refuse cans? Ms. Elaine Mann, a resident, commented that with the increase in cases of "dog flu", many dog runs in Northern New Jersey are being closed this year.

Mr. Lupia also commented that every year the shuffleboard court is repainted and maintained throughout the season, yet he never sees anyone playing shuffleboard.

Mr. Ken Rogers, a resident, questioned the disruption of the greenway behind his property and asked if the Department of Public Works (DPW) was authorized to cut down trees on the greenway. Mr. Stuart responded indicating the information is available from the Shade Tree Commission. Mr. Hammond of the Shade Tree Commission gave instructions to Ed Thompson, DPW Director on what needed to be done.

Mr. Rogers asked about the status of the Reverse 911 system for Colts Neck. There were five robberies within Colts Neck and he was one of them. Mr. Florek advised that the issue was discussed last year and tabled; however, this issue can be addressed again.

Mr. Rogers then asked about the deer population and commented that he had a dead deer in front of his property. Mr. Rogers was advised that the Township has a contract with the State to remove the deer, and he should contact the Health Department to report the situation.

With no further comments from the public, Mayor Forester closed the public comment portion of the meeting.

19. **RESOLUTION 2005-261:** EXECUTIVE SESSION was read by Mayor Forester at 9:16 p.m. With no further comments, Mrs. Burry made a motion to adjourn and go into Executive Session, seconded by Mr. Hennessy and unanimously carried.
