

**TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK
TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING
MARCH 25, 2015
7:30 P.M. AT TOWN HALL**

The meeting of the Colts Neck Township Committee was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Mayor Schatzle followed by a salute to the flag led by local news reporter Tony Senk. The following statement was read by Township Clerk, Mr. Bowden: "The notice requirements of the New Jersey Public Meetings Law have been satisfied by forwarding a News Release to the Asbury Park Press on December 20, 2014 stating that a regular meeting of the Colts Neck Township Committee would be held March 25, 2015 at 7:30 p.m., Colts Neck Town Hall, 124 Cedar Drive, Colts Neck, New Jersey. The notice requirements have been posted on the Township website and a copy is on file in the Office of the Township Clerk."

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:** MEETING OF MARCH 11, 2015. Mr. Fitzgerald made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Macnow and unanimously carried.

2. **MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION:** NATIONAL ALCOHOL AWARENESS MONTH – APRIL 2015. Mayor Schatzle read the proclamation in full, which recognizes the involvement of alcohol in deaths, accidents, and criminal acts for those as young as 10 years of age, noting drinking begins, on average, at 13.1 years of age. By this proclamation, all are urged to join with others in advancing efforts to strengthen the enforcement of the underage drinking laws and to build partnerships among local agencies, elected officials, law enforcement, businesses, schools and communities to prevent underage drinking and alcoholism.

3. **ORDINANCE 2015-3:** AN ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40:4-45.14) was read by title at second reading by Mayor Schatzle. Mr. Bowden advised the local government CAP law limits any increase in the annual budget to 1.5% unless authorized by ordinance to authorize an additional 2% increase to a total of 3.5% over the prior year's final appropriations. Mr. Bowden noted the 2% increase amounts to \$155,132.34, and if it is not used in 2015, the extra 2% can be used in either of the following two years. Mr. Bowden stated the budget introduced tonight is under that CAP. Hearing no comment from the Governing Body, Mayor Schatzle opened the public hearing. Hearing no comments, Mayor Schatzle closed the public hearing.

Mr. Macnow made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Fitzgerald and unanimously carried.

4. **2015 MUNICIPAL BUDGET:** Mayor Schatzle noted the Township Committee, Township Administrator, Chief Financial Officer and Department Heads worked very hard to develop this year's municipal budget being introduced this evening. Mayor Schatzle stated he appreciated how well everyone worked together in this process. Mayor Schatzle's comments pertaining to the introduction of the 2015 municipal budget totaling \$12,173,643 are appended. Mayor Schatzle set the public hearing April 29, 2015, 7:30 p.m., at Town Hall.

5. **RESOLUTION 2015-40:** RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING INTRODUCTION OF 2015 MUNICIPAL BUDGET was read by title by Mayor Schatzle. Budget totals are as follows: General Appropriations: \$11,816,629.26; Dedicated Open Space, \$357,014.00, totaling \$12,173,642.26, of which \$6,784,534.00 will be raised by property taxes to support the budget. Mr. Macnow thanked Mr. Bowden, Mr. Antonides and the Department Heads for their work on the 2015 municipal budget. Mr. Fitzgerald noted this is another year where this municipality has stayed away from using the deferred school tax, when others have not. Mr. Macnow made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Fitzgerald and unanimously carried.

6. **RESOLUTION 2015-41:** RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING SELF-EXAMINATION OF 2015 BUDGET was read by title by Mayor Schatzle. Mr. Bowden stated the Chief Financial Officer certified the Township meets the necessary conditions to participate in the self-examination program for the 2015 budget year. Mr. Fitzgerald spoke of the merits of the self-examination mechanism noting it expedites the approval process to adopt the budget. 7. **RESOLUTION 2015-42:** RESOLUTION CONFIRMING AGREEMENT BETWEEN TEAMSTERS UNION NO. 11 AND THE TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK was read by title by Mayor Schatzle. This resolution approves and authorizes the execution of a collective bargaining agreement between the Teamsters Union No. 11 (white collar unit) and the Township of Colts Neck pursuant to the terms and conditions of the agreement. Mr. Fitzgerald stated this is the first time there is a contract within a contract, in particular, ending longevity for those hired after January 1, 2015. Mr. Fitzgerald thanked Mr. Bowden, noting he did a good job negotiating this contract and made a motion to approve, which was seconded by Mr. Macnow and unanimously carried.

8. **ORDINANCE 2015-5:** AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED THE 2015 SALARY ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK (WHITE COLLAR UNIT) was read by title at first reading by Mayor Schatzle. Mayor Schatzle stated the negotiation of this contract was excellent work by Administrator Bowden. Mayor Schatzle noted Mr. Bowden could have retired December 31, 2014; however he chose to time his departure after the budget is completed and the collective bargaining agreements were taken care of, which is the hardest part of his job. Mayor Schatzle thanked Mr. Bowden for his dedication to the Township for doing so. Mayor Schatzle thanked the White Collar Union members for working with the Township and reaching agreement. Mr. Bowden summarized the agreement as follows: This is a three-year contract commencing January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2017, with a two percent increase each year. Unused sick leave can be carried forward to a maximum of 60 days, and upon retirement or resignation in good standing, employees will receive one day's pay for every two days accrued to a maximum of 60 days and a maximum payout of \$4,000. Mr. Fitzgerald made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Macnow and unanimously carried. Mayor Schatzle set the public hearing April 8, 2015.

9. **ORDINANCE 2015-6:** AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF COLTS NECK IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH AND THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 62, SHADE TREE COMMISSION was read by title by Mayor Schatzle at first reading. Mr. Macnow stated this ordinance makes minor changes to the existing municipal code clarifying the responsibility for approval and removal of street trees. Specifically, no tree within a Township right-of-way may be removed by the adjoining property owner without Shade Tree Commission approval. Additionally, once the maintenance guarantee posted by the developer is released and the Township has accepted the tree,

street trees planted on private property may be removed by the property owner at any time and for any reason. Mr. Bowden stated the genesis of this issue was as a result of Superstorm Sandy. Mr. Macnow made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Orgo and carried by Messrs. Schatzle, Orgo and Macnow; Mr. Fitzgerald abstained, noting a property owner could remove street trees that were in a pattern within the development without the approval of the Township Committee or the Township Planner. Mayor Schatzle set the public hearing April 8, 2015.

10. **RESOLUTION 2015-43:** RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING APPLICATION FOR THE COLTS NECK ALLIANCE FOR THE PREVENTION OF ALCOHOLISM AND DRUG ABUSE FUNDING FOR FISCAL GRANT CYCLE JULY 2014 – JUNE 2019 was read by title by Mayor Schatzle. This resolution authorizes the submission of a strategic plan for the municipal alliance grant for fiscal year 2015-2016 in the amount of DEDR, \$22,150; Cash Match, \$5,537.50; and In-Kind Match, \$16,612.50. Mr. Bowden stated this grant funds many worthwhile programs within the Township. Mr. Fitzgerald made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Macnow and unanimously carried.

11. **RESOLUTION 2015-44:** RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING FEES FOR TOWNSHIP POLICE SPECIAL ASSIGNMENTS was read by title by Mayor Schatzle. Mayor Schatzle stated approximately every five years, the fee schedules for road jobs are compared to surrounding municipalities. Mayor Schatzle noted Chief Sauter advised the Township's current fees were on the low side, and several revisions were made to make the Township's fees consistent with surrounding municipalities. Mr. Macnow noted two Officers from different municipalities covering the same road job were being paid at differing rates, with the Colts Neck Officer on the lower end. Mr. Macnow noted the rate increases are being passed on to every user equally. Mr. Bowden stated the rates can be tweaked at any time by resolution. Mr. Macnow made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Fitzgerald and unanimously carried.

13. **RESOLUTION 2015-45A:** RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING 2015 FEES FOR RECREATION FACILITIES was read by title by Mayor Schatzle. Mayor Schatzle stated a previous resolution set the fees for recreation programs while this resolution sets the fees for the use of Township fields and facilities. Mr. Orgo expressed concern about a \$10 increase in field fees and the over-use of the fields last year due to unlimited games of out-of-town teams. Discussion ensued about the Township's role, the Sports Foundation's role, and the goal of self-sustaining fields. Mr. Fitzgerald made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Macnow and carried by Messrs. Schatzle, Fitzgerald and Macnow; Mr. Orgo opposed.

15. **ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT:** Mr. Bowden stated he has nothing to add to his Administrative Report. Mr. Bowden stated he received a request from the Lions Club to serve alcohol during the annual Kentucky Derby Day event scheduled in the Bucks Mill Community Center. Mr. Bowden noted all requirements have been complied with and this event has taken place in previous years without incident. Mr. Fitzgerald made a motion to approve, seconded by Mr. Macnow and unanimously carried by voice vote.

There is also a request from the Central New Jersey Mensa group to serve beer and wine at their annual picnic at Bucks Mill Park. Again this event has taken place without incident in previous years and upon approval, a certificate of insurance will be provided to the Township. 17. TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE REPORTS

Mr. Fitzgerald had no report this evening.

Mr. Macnow spoke of a meeting held with representatives from most sending municipalities to Colts Neck High School and staff from the Law and Public Service Program at the High School to discuss a new internship program within the Freehold Regional High School District (FRHSD). Beta testing is planned for April 2015 with student placements in their sending districts starting in September 2015. Mr. Macnow noted the students in this program are interested in careers in law and public service and are sharp, enthusiastic, goal oriented, and will benefit greatly from this internship experience. Mr. Macnow stated FRHSD received State approval to implement this program, which is part of the Senior seminars.

Mr. Macnow reported he attended the Friends of the Library meeting, during which they expressed thanks to the Department of Public Works staff for their assistance with this year's book sale. DPW staff were there to remove the snow from the unexpected snowfall opening weekend and came to fix the leak in the Friends room.

Mr. Macnow reported the Shade Tree Commission received approval for their application for arboretum status of the core site. Mr. Macnow noted the Library has copies of a map developed which shows the various specimens throughout the Town Hall core site, which can be taken in hand to refer to when walking through the park. Mr. Fitzgerald commented the arboretum status is National recognition, which normally takes months to receive. Dr. Boak's painstaking work resulted in arboretum recognition within weeks of applying.

Mayor Schatzle reported the Recreation spring program brochure was just released with upcoming favorite events such as the Easter Egg Hunt, Breakfast with the Easter Bunny, and the Colts Neck Fair.

Mayor Schatzle reported on March 12, the Colts Neck Historical Society, a group of citizens whose goal was to preserve the town's history, dissolved due to their ages and moving out of town. The Historical Society, comprised of the officers Louise Whitney, Shirley Miller, and John Niemela, donated the sum of \$52,121.80, the balance of their bank account, to the Township's Historical Preservation Trust Fund for use in historical preservation within the Township in accordance with the executed agreement between the Historical Society and the Township.

Mayor Schatzle reported the Bloodmobile is set up at the First Aid Squad building tonight for those that wanted to participate.

18. COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Hearing no further comments, Mayor Schatzle opened the meeting to public comment.

Mr. Jeff Sauter, a resident, spoke of his calculations relating to his OPRA requests and appeals, and he estimates the cost to be approximately \$37,000 as opposed to \$25,000. Mr. Sauter requested an update on the filling of the Administrator's position. Mayor Schatzle advised this is ongoing.

Mr. Vince Domidion, a resident and Chair of the Monmouth County Planning Board, noted during a budget workshop, he suggested using County GIS mapping resources to determine the length of each Township road to save engineering fees. Information on date paved, current condition, etc., could be saved for each road and used when planning the road paving schedule. Mr. Domidion stated Mr. Anfuso will be working with the County on this initiative.

Mr. Chuck Camarata, a resident, questioned the amount of revenue the Township receives from road jobs in a year. Mr. Bowden advised Mr. Antonides would be able to provide the exact dollar figure and suggested he speak with Mr. Antonides during his next visit to the Town Hall area or telephone him directly. Mr. Camarata questioned if roads are going to be paved this year. Mayor Schatzle responded Mr. Gerken is working on this, and when cost estimations are completed, bonding will be discussed.

Mr. Ed Piotrowski, a resident, questioned the range of payment for road jobs. Mr. Bowden responded the Officer receives \$55, the Township \$8, and \$5 if a car is involved.

Hearing no further comments, Mayor Schatzle closed the public comment portion of the meeting.

2015 BUDGET INTRODUCTION

MARCH 25, 2015

MAYOR JAMES C. SCHATZLE

- The total municipal budget for 2015 is \$12,173,643.

This is inclusive of the \$357,014 that will be raised by the dedicated open space tax.
- The municipal purposes tax will increase by 1.4 cents this year.
- For a home assessed at \$800,000, this represents an increase of \$112.00 in property taxes for the year.
- The budget is under both the tax levy CAP and appropriation CAP.
- \$1,126,226 of surplus funds have been utilized to offset the budget, leaving just over \$565,000 for next year or the future.
- No school tax deferral has been used to offset the tax rate.
- State Aid remains the same as last year and totals \$1,980,938.
- \$6,784,534 will be raised by property taxes to support the budget.
- Most operating budgets remained about the same as last year, or have minor increases.

- Major expenses within the budget include the following:
 - Snow removal costs remain at roughly the same high level as last year. Operational costs have been set at \$430,500, with an additional \$60,000 appropriated for snow control overtime.
 - The Township borrowed \$2.2 million for clean-up costs associated with Superstorm Sandy and has thus far been reimbursed just under \$1.8 million from FEMA. The difference must now be paid back by the Township over the next three years. As such, the budget includes an appropriation of \$139,000 for this purpose.
 - Pension costs have increased by some \$81,000.

- The budget includes a very aggressive “pay as you go” capital program in the amount of \$304,975 that includes the following:
 - \$30,000 for recreational field improvements.
 - \$26,000 to replace the First Aid Squad heating system.
 - \$18,000 for Fire Department turn-out gear and a thermal imaging camera.
 - \$34,500 for a marked Police 4 wheel drive vehicle.
 - \$40,475 for Police vehicle computers, radar units and in-car cameras now required by law.
 - \$45,000 for a Public Works F-350 truck with plow.
 - \$57,000 for Town Hall and building improvements including the cupola, step repair and Courthouse/Police roof repairs.
 - \$20,000 for a new well for the Bucks Mill Park Community Center.
 - \$20,000 for computer upgrades for all departments.
 - \$8,000 for a Court recording system and portable sound system.
 - \$6,000 for continued underground storage tank removal and monitoring.

- No new or additional employees are contained in the budget.
